The cover of this book was prepared by American sculptor, painter, and designer, William Schickel. Schickel is a graduate of Notre Dame University with a graduate degree from New York State School of Design. He served apprenticeships with Hungarian sculptor Eugene Kormandi and stained glass designer Emil Frei. Schickel depicts Jacques Maritain as a "Man of the Cross and the Holy Spirit." He says his view of Maritain is inspired by the latter's "courage in standing intellectually at the intersection of good and evil without blinking"; it is in the light of this spirit that Schickel opened the Maritain Gallery in Loveland, Ohio--namely, for the purpose of nurturing a cultural and spiritual renaissance in America with art as its principal medium.
